

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

Like many collectors I started collecting coins in my youth. After losing interest I sold the meager collection that I had at the time. One of the problems I think was the fact that I didn't read much about the hobby and felt frustrated as a result. Several years later when I walked into a local coin store I started looking around and instantly became obsessed. This time I took a lot more time to read, study and research coins. This is what I think helped solidify my interest in coin collecting. Joining the RNA also provided me with the opportunity to talk with other collectors and learn even more.

Over the years I have collected many different coins trying to figure out the area(s) that I prefer. Three significant areas that have sparked my interest have been Colonial American coins, Belgian Congo-related coins and early Latin American coins. I have since sold off my Colonial American collection due to financial needs and sorely miss them. At one point I had 20 different Vermont copper varieties in nice grades from fine to almost uncirculated in rarities 1-5. As many of you know I have one of the finest and most comprehensive Belgian Congo and related collections that exists. Yet I still find new discoveries from time to time. Don't count on any one reference to inform you about what's out there. Many references are out of date or not very comprehensive. I have been a contributor to the Krause publications for the Belgian Congo-related coins for about a decade and assisted with my knowledge and photographs for a book on the subject that was published about two years ago.

I have been a member of the Rochester Numismatic Association since 1996. I joined just in time to meet one of the club's most famous members, John J. Pittman, shortly before he passed away. I also was able to get to know his wife and daughter Polly. I was able to sit in, along with other club members who were interested at the time,

on private viewings of some of the Pittman collection. I also attended the first Pittman sale in Baltimore with a fellow member where we saw some eye-popping prices realized. I still have one piece from that sale. I purchased one coin from the third auction that consisted of World coins. I won that coin via mail-bid which is virtually impossible these days in an auction like that with the availability of advanced bidding technology. I still retain this coin in my Belgian Congo collection.

I have made new friends and continue to learn a lot at the club's meetings. I have watched many very informative, interesting and sometimes entertaining presentations at our meetings. Membership certainly does have its privileges. The RNA has a large number of very well informed minds. I particularly enjoy when members bring in coins from their collections to show. These are great opportunities for some members to see coins they might not otherwise see in real life. I try to show material from my collection at most meetings.

After being a member for about four years I moved to California for 15 years. But I did not forget the club and remained a member all those years. I read the newsletters and tried to keep in touch with some members from time to time. When I moved back to Rochester one of the first things that I wanted to do was attend a meeting since I was never able to do so during the years I lived in California, even on my brief visits to Rochester. I have presented exhibits at our annual coin show each year since my return winning best of show twice out of four times.

The annual RNA picnic will be Sunday August 11th at the White Brook Nature Park from 1:00-4:00 p.m. at a cost of \$10.00 per person. Tickets are available on the RNA website or you can pay the RNA treasurer. I hope to see everyone there!

I look forward to a positive and fun-filled year of collecting and sharing with you all.

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
A **DOLPH WEINMAN'S 1904 ST. LOUIS EXPO MEDAL**

The St. Louis World's Fair is remembered for a number of events. It was the site of the third modern Olympic games. It introduced the first ice cream cone. United States President Theodore Roosevelt gave a speech there.

For the numismatist, the American Numismatic Association's annual convention was held there. Famed promoter and numismatist Farrow Zerbe persuaded the U.S. Mint to strike and issue proof sets for our newest territory, the Philippines. Some 1,350 sets were offered at the Philippine expo pavilion.

For today's medal collector we remember Adolph Weinman's first commemorative medal commission, the beautiful, nearly four inch gold clad award medal that also was sold in a bronze souvenir edition at the fair.

The images in this article are from a St. Louis Exposition medal in the RNA collection.

The front of the medal shows a figure of liberty draping a semi-nude young woman in the American flag. The young woman may represent the young American protected by liberty. But maybe Weinman is saying more if we really study the medal closely.

Under 10x magnification on an unworn medal the sharp-eyed observer may spot a plethora of honey bees attached to the young woman's modestly held drapery. The bees are a reference to Napoleon Bonaparte who had solid gold bees sewn to his coronation robe. Bonaparte related the bees to the first king of France,

the legendary Childeric who died in AD481. But he made a mistake. The bees should have been cicadas.

Childeric's burial was accidentally discovered in 1653 at Tournai in Belgium. He was son of Merovech from which the Merovingian dynasty derives its name. His son Clovis is credited with ending Roman rule in France by his AD486 victory at the Battle of Suissons.

Childeric's burial objects included 100 gold and 200 silver Roman and Byzantine coins. More importantly to our story the burial also included 300 solid gold cicadas, symbol of eternal life. The cicada wings were inlaid with garnets and were sewn on the king's brocade cloak; it was the most elaborate Frankish burial ever discovered. Unfortunately most of this treasure was stolen from the Imperial Art Gallery in Paris in 1831. Drawings of the treasured items were made before the theft.

Weinman must have been familiar with the story of Napoleon's role and perhaps also that of Childeric but spun the meaning differently. He took the Imperial Robe and placed it protectively over the young woman using the allegory that in 1904 America the common people held the royal power of state. The Louisiana Exposition medal thus speaks of the French involvement in the sale of Louisiana to America by Napoleon as well as the transition of imperial power from a king or emperor to a free people.

Weinman's symbolism is subtle but unmistakable.

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LIFE MEMBERSHIP NOMINATION

Editor's Note

RNA bylaws designate three types of membership: regular, family and honorary life.

According to the bylaws, "honorary life member nominees shall be selected by the Board of Directors from those who have been members for at least ten years and who, in the judgment of the Board of Directors, have made some notable contribution to the science of numismatics. Any member of the Board of Directors may propose any member of the Association meeting the qualifications therefore for honorary life membership. Election to honorary life membership, upon the recommendation of the Board of Directors,

shall, after written notice to the membership at least thirty (30) days prior to an annual meeting, be held, by secret ballot at an annual meeting of the membership of the association and shall be by the affirmative vote of ninety percent (90%) of the members present at such meeting.

Honorary life members shall be entitled to all privileges of the Association but shall be exempt from the payment of dues or special assessments."

Life membership is a rare honor. Currently there are three life members: William Coe, Arthur Cohen and Gerard Muhl. The RNA Board of Directors has approved the nomination of Ted Vaccarella to be the next RNA life member.

Club News & Notes

Dues Increase

The RNA Board of Directors approved a dues increase to \$30.00 per year effective July 1, 2019. The last dues increase was from \$20.00 to \$25.00 in 2010-2011. The increase to \$25.00 was 25% while the current increase is 20%.

Using the latest U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index calculator, the 2019-2010 dues would be \$29.34 in 2019 dollars. In other words, the new dues essentially cover the cost of inflation and not an increase in real dollars.

Some member services have been added and others improved since the previous dues increase representing an increase of real value per dues dollar.

Website Passwords

As with all websites with protected data, the RNA website will require a password change in July. We did not do this last July so users could acclimate themselves to the new website without disruption. Sometime in July members who have paid their dues will be allowed access to the Members Only area using their new membership numbers. The format of the password is:

MxxxYYYYMMDD or FxxxYYYYMMDD or
fxxxYYYYMMDD or LxxxYYYYMMDD

The M is for standard member, F is for main family member, f is for associate family member and L is for lifetime member.

YYYYMMDD is the date you became a member.

Every member received a password when the website went live.

The change is xxx, your member number. This

number changes annually and is controlled by Bill Coe's membership management. Your membership number is on your 2019 membership card. If you have not paid your dues, you will not have access to the Members Only area of the website.

There will be a notification on the login page when the new passwords go into effect.

Please do not share your password.
